

brings like-minded high school juniors and seniors together for a week-long Second Amendment experience in Washington, D.C. In D.C., students participate in activities ranging from tours of monuments, debates, and even shooting on the NRA's range. All of these activities allow teenagers, like me, to be able to make friends and connections with people who share the same passion for the Second Amendment as I do. SWM MICARBINE

We tested the Chiappa M1-22 Carbine in .22LR last year and reviewed it in the Fall 2018 issue of Junior Shooters. This time we were very pleased to be able to test out the Chiappa M1-9 carbine in 9mm and I was impressed by both the function and accuracy.

I have always had a nostalgic feeling for the M1 Carbine (United States Carbine, Caliber .30, M1). A standard firearm for the U.S. Military during World War II, the Korean War, and well into the Vietnam War, its appeal to the civilian market for

collectors is huge. The M1 Carbine is a semi-automatic firearm while the M2/M3 are selective fire. However, it is the M1 Carbine that is readily available and a lot of fun to shoot.

The carbine uses Berretta Model 92 9mm pistol standard magazines. Two 10-round magazines come with each M1-9. The firearm uses a straight blowback design, unlike the original gas operated (short-stroke piston) with a rotating locking bolt designed M1.30 carbine from World War II. It is a semi-automatic and has dovetail machined front sights and a fully adjustable peep rear sight also like the original. This gun is a lot of fun to shoot and we got through function testing successfully firing every round of Armscor 124-grain

JHP and Black Hills Ammunition 115-grain FMJ. Accuracy was amazing at 100 yards. Kaden was able to hit the small rifle popper consistently and got a 3-shot group of 1-1/4" at 100 yards. There are only two areas I can think to improve on. The standard pushbutton bolt stop was not included on this gun and the trigger pull is stiff, though it will probably lighten over time, and a lighter spring may help.

At an MSRP of \$636 or \$559, depending upon what model you get, this is a great buy and I recommend

you get one. It is fun!

Kaden: The M1 carbine has very little recoil and the sights were easy to use. The stock has a good fit on me but the trigger pull on the M1 carbine was a little stiff. I really enjoyed shooting it and would like to have one. I would probably put a red dot on it and see if the trigger pull could be adjusted.





Both Armscor 124-grain JHP and Black Hills Ammunition 9mm FMJ 115-grain cartridges were used for testing. The Black Hills got the tightest group with 3 shots in 1-1/4" goup at 100 yards. This is really good shooting considering the first time out with military style iron sights at 100 yards and is indicative of the quality of the firearm and the shooter.


One of the great things about being the "marketing person" in an organization like the Scholastic Shooting Sports Foundation is that you get to meet some of the most amazing young people from all walks of life.

At this years Shot Show, I was introduced to one such "young person", Kyleigh Kozel from Carmichaels, Pennsylvania. From the second we met; it was easy to see this was a very special young person.

Kyleigh currently competes on the Hunting Hills Hawkeyes, a Greene County, PA Scholastic Clay Target Program team. Kyleigh began shooting in the Pennsylvania SCTP at age 10, seven years ago following her brother Tristan who had competed in SCTP for 5 years.

Kyleigh indicated her most challenging obstacle starting out was finding a shotgun that she could hold and mount for 100 rounds. Learning and practicing stance fundamentals from her SCTP coaches proved key to handling that early shotgun along with being taught the correct set up (hold point-break point) and swing characteristics. Kyleigh smiled when she added "I wanted to beat my brother's scores and come home with trophies too, I just had to learn how to do it."

Kyleigh joined the Hunting Hills Hawkeyes SCTP Team at its home course of Hunting Hills owned by Roy and Sally Sisler in Dilliner PA, "Mr. Sisler has



always been extra supportive of having girls on the team, he believes in challenging us to be better competitors!" she said. Roy Sisler added, "Kyleigh is so much more than an outstanding youth shooter. She has the highest respect for firearms and for other people, she is always the first one to offer to help new younger shooters and is always positive".

During Kyleigh's time in SCTP, with the help, guidance, and support of her dad Kevin has sought out different instructors who have helped shape and contributed to her shooting development. "I've found that some instructors have a great way of helping me understand how to read and shoot certain birds." Her longtime and current instructor is NSCA Level III Michael Mohr, who developed Shooting Academy Nemacolin Woodlands and then went on to design and manage as

the Director of the Seven Springs Sporting Clays complex. "Mike knows in just a few minutes what I need to work on after we discuss my last shooting competition, he pushes me to work at building my shot presentation inventory in my mind so that everything becomes automatic muscle memory," stated Kyleigh. "He's also helped me realize how important it is to work on my Pre-shot routine and mental game which is what really wins tournaments." In a separate interview, Mike Mohr added, "Kyleigh and I usually work on one issue or target problem per lesson. She already performs well so we take the good and make it consistent."

Kyleigh added "Seven Springs has contributed so much to help me train and compete. Mike really believes in giving his time and effort to SCTP shooters which is the future of the sport.



Kyleigh has put the skills she's worked diligently on to great use by winning 1st place female honors in her PA SCTP Sporting Clays divisions for the last four years straight with numerous 1st through 3rd squad team wins. Kyleigh also took 1st place female at the PA SCTP Skeet Championship in her division last year.

Three years ago, Dale Pancake and Justin Dodd, the Founding Partners of Italian Firearms Group took notice of Kyleigh's shooting journey and accomplishments and wanted to help accelerate her shooting progress. They offered to sponsor her with a F.A.I.R. 12 gauge over/under Racing Prestige model that would be able to withstand shooting in excess of 100,000 shotgun rounds. "The gun felt so dynamic in my hands when I shot, I didn't know how natural an Italian made shotgun would feel when I went after the birds." "I am so thankful to Dale and Justin for everything they have enabled me to do. I traveled to Italy this past February to visit the manufacturing facility of F.A.I.R. which is the Isidoro Rizzini shotgun company, and after seeing and understanding the process of the shotguns being made and tested, I am so proud to be shooting the best shotgun from Italy in my opinion."

When she's not practicing or shooting competition birds, Kyleigh loves other outdoor Fly fishing, sports. kayaking, skiing, hunting and travel top her list of "can't wait to do again." But that's only a part of what makes Kyleigh such an outstanding young woman. She is serious about music, sports, IT, and is a good student. No matter what she is doing, Kyleigh loves competition and always wants to be the best.

Kyleigh is a member of the Carmichaels High School band, where she plays the alto



saxophone, she's also played softball and basketball for the school. She's amember of National Honor Society and enjoys history, writing and political science debates. Kyleigh's plans are to attend college to pursue Business and Communication degrees.






Other top team finishes include the



## JOIN SASF

#### PROGRAM GOALS:

- Teach the safe and responsible handling and use of firearms
- Provide a supportive team-based environment using the shooting sports as the catalyst for teaching life lessons and skills that emphasize positive character traits and citizenship values
- Introduce young shooters to a sport that can be enjoyed for a lifetime, one that offers a level playing field, and one that all family members can enjoy together

#### MISSION STATEMENT:

The Scholastic Shooting Sports Foundation is an educational-athletic organization that exists to introduce school-age youths to the shooting sports and to facilitate their continued involvement by providing, promoting, and perpetuating opportunities to safely and enjoyably participate and compete in a high-quality, team-based sport led by trained adult coaches focused on enhancing the personal growth and development of their athletes.

#### VISION STATEMENT:

To continue to be recognized and respected as the leader in the youth development shooting sports programs.

#### PROGRAM SPONSOR:

The Scholastic Shooting Sports Foundation (SSSF) is the National Governing Body (NGB) for youth speed shooting and the Scholastic Action Shooting Program (SASP). SASP was started by SSSF in 2012.

#### PROGRAM SCOPE:

The SASP offers participation in speed shooting using pistols and .22 rifles.

#### PROGRAM FOCUS:

TEAMS! The SASP is a TEAM-BASED program, focusing on youth development. Participation in SASP should be fun, and there is no place for a win-at-all-costs attitude.

#### TEAM SUPERVISION:

An adult Volunteer Head Coach leads each team. Volunteer State Advisors provide support for in-state activities and support to their Volunteer Head Coaches and Assistant Coaches. Full-time Directors of Development coordinate the program, and they are assisted by National Coach Trainers and the National Training Team. National Coach Trainers are responsible for coach development and training.

#### REGISTRATION FEES:

The registration fee for State Advisors, Head Coaches, Assistant Coaches, and Adult Volunteers is \$30.00. This fee covers the cost of liability insurance and a portion of the cost of a background check. All adults working directly with SASP athletes must be registered with the SSSF. To be covered by SSSF liability insurance, a volunteer must be registered with the National Program.

The membership for each registered athlete, including Collegiate, is \$20.00. The fee covers the cost of insurance and awards. All athletes must be registered by their Head Coach.

#### PARTICIPANT ELIGIBILITY:

Students in grades 6-12 are eligible for the Intermediate and Senior Divisions in the pistol and rifle disciplines. Students in grades 5 and below are eligible for the Rookie Division in the rifle discipline. There is no age limit for those enrolled as full-time students in the Collegiate Division. College athletes must be enrolled and attending an accredited college or university. All athletes must be academically eligible to participate in their school's extracurricular sports program.






